







Bay a "national treasure."






The 2014 Bay Agreement adopts those watershed wide conservation goals.








Indigenous cultural landscapes are evocative of the natural and cultural resources supporting American Indian lifeways and settlement patterns in the early 17th century.








Captain John Smith Chesapeake National Historic Trail

To commemorate the exploratory voyages of Captain Smith on the Chesapeake Bay and its tributaries in 1607-1609;


To share knowledge about the American Indian societies and cultures of the 17th century;






Making the Trail Visible and Visitor Ready: A Plan for the James River Segment


A Joint Segment Plan for National Trails Along the Lower Susquehanna River

Provides funding to create public water access on the Captain John Smith Trail
